National Incident Management System

(NIMS)

- **What ? . . .** NIMS provides a consistent nationwide template . . .
- **Who? . . .** to enable Federal, State, tribal, and local governments, the private sector, and nongovernmental organizations to work together . . .
- **How? . . .** to prepare for, prevent, respond to, recover from, and mitigate the effects of incidents regardless of cause, size, location, or complexity . . .
- **Why? . . .** in order to reduce the loss of life and property, and harm to the environment.

Preparedness: Continuous Cycle



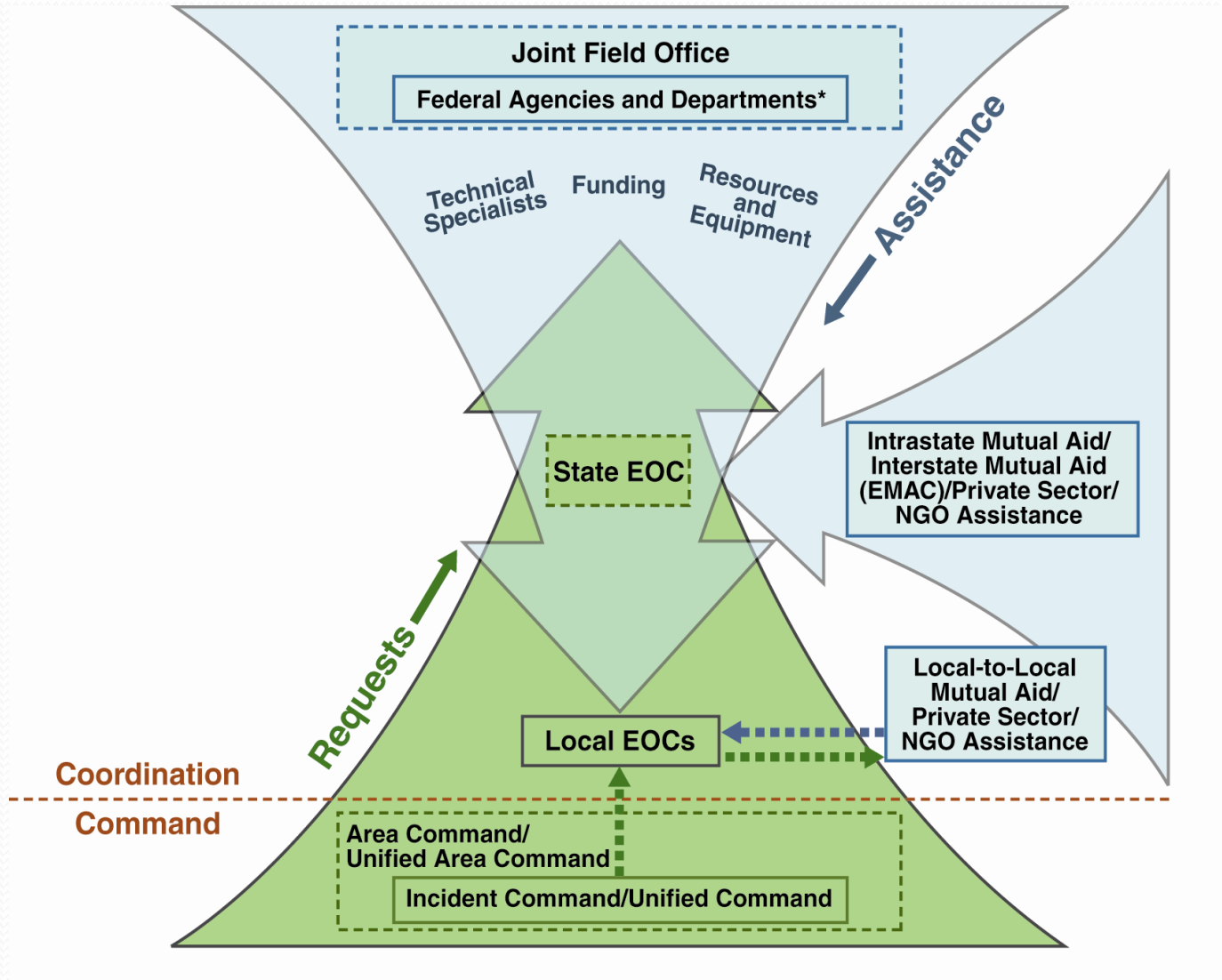
Mutual Aid and Assistance Agreements

Mutual aid and assistance agreements:

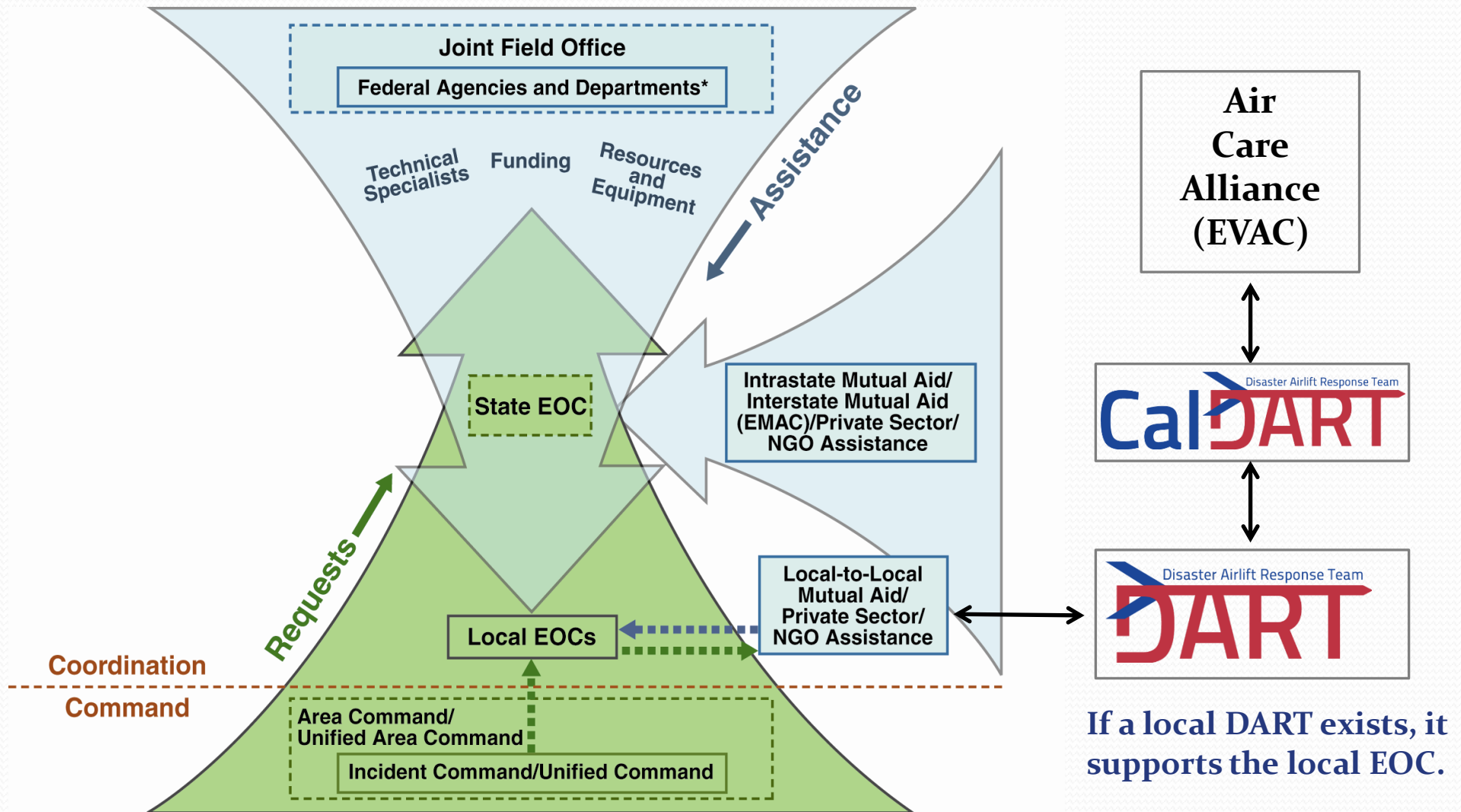
- Allow neighboring jurisdictions to support one another during an incident.
- Are formal documents that identify the resources that jurisdictions are willing to share during an incident.



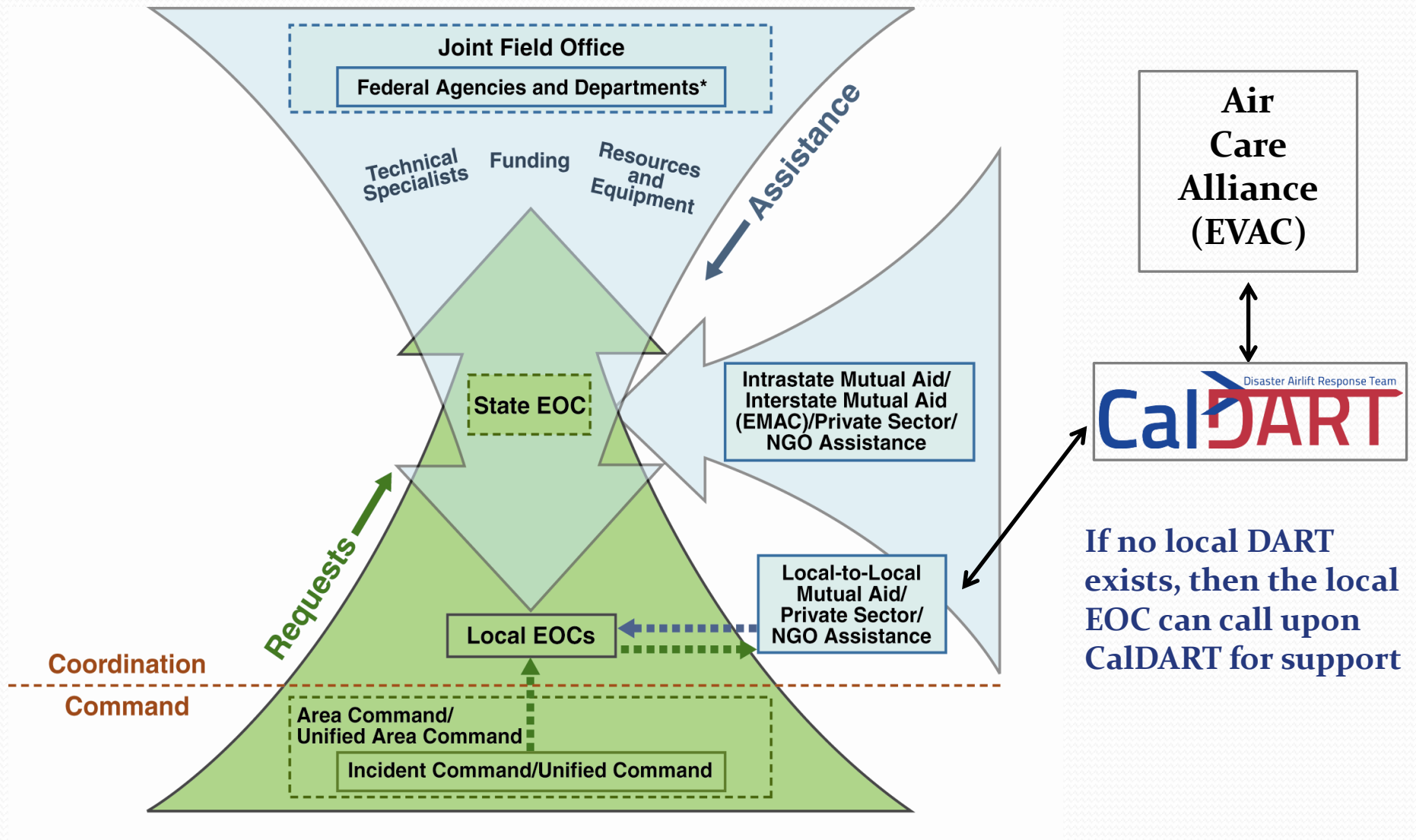
Flow of Requests and Assistance



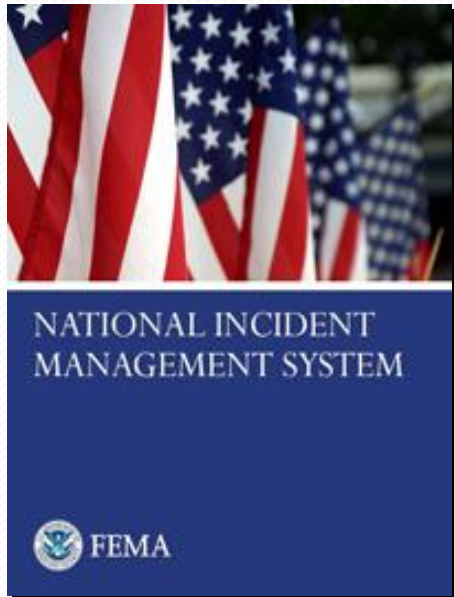

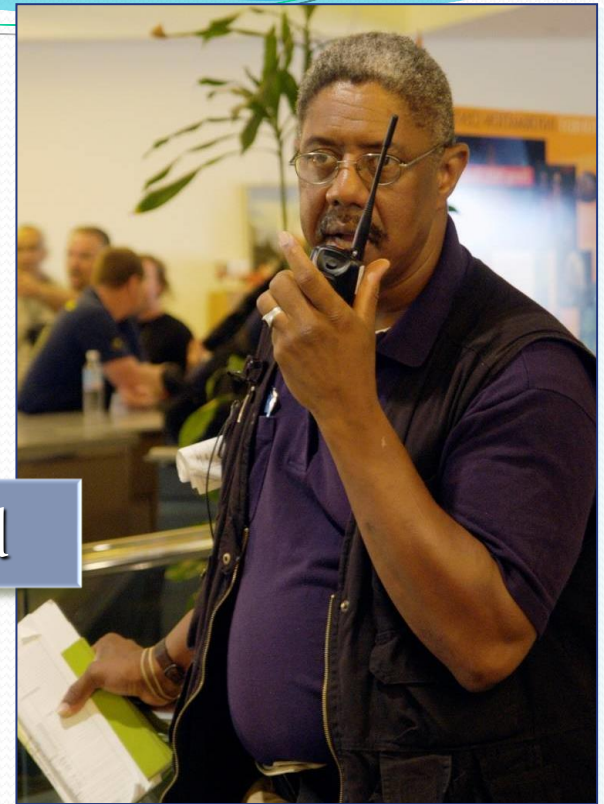

Airplanes help with logistics



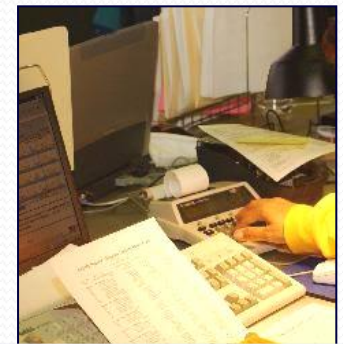

Incident Command Post

The Incident Command Post is:

- The location from which the Incident Command directs operations.
- Generally located at or in the immediate vicinity of the incident site.



Emergency Operations Center (EOC)



The EOC does not command the on-scene level of the incident.

A central location that supports Incident Command by:

- Making executive/policy decisions.
- Coordinating interagency relations.
- Dispatching and tracking requested resources.
- Collecting, analyzing, and disseminating information.

Interfacing Pilots with NIMS, ICS

- Airspace closures prevent pilot self-deployment
- How to volunteer during a disaster:
 - Be a member of an organized disaster response group
 - Air transport service support requested by:
 - Incident Commander
 - Emergency Operations Center (city, county, state, federal)
 - Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster
 - Airspace opened for specified operations by FAA
